Numerous other websites offer free access to newspaper articles. FindArticles.com provides free access on the Web to thousands of publications, including many newspapers (articles.findarticles.com/p/home?tb=art). From the Library of Congress Online Reading Room website, you can find links to hundreds of online newspapers and journals (www.loc.gov/rr/news/lists.html). The Write News website provides links to all major newspapers maintaining online services (writenews.com/newslinks/).

PERIODICALS

Periodicals include widely circulated magazines (such as *Time* and *Newsweek*) and journals (such as *Foreign Affairs* and *Washington Quarterly*). Your library might subscribe to an electronic database and indexing system such as InfoTrac, Ingenta, ArticleFirst, Expanded Academic ASAP, or Lexis/Nexis Scholastic Universe. Most such systems provide a computer-based searching system as well as full-text access to periodical articles. Some print publications also provide limited access to their materials online. The following paragraphs provide just a sampling of the periodicals available online.

The Nation (www.thenation.com): A liberal publication, *The Nation* provides free access to approximately 40-60 percent of its articles since 1999. Subscribers can access all material since 1999. The digital archives provide access to all articles since 1895 for a fee.

National Review (www.nationalreview.com): This conservative magazine provides free access to many of its articles and web features. Subscribers can download a digital copy of the magazine.

New Republic (www.tnr.com): Subscribers can access the magazine's archives. Known for its liberal perspective, *The New Republic* provides free access to web-only content.

Newsweek (www.msnbc.msn.com/id/3032542/): This popular newsmagazine has partnered with the online news service MSNBC to provide an extensive amount of news. Users can search articles that have appeared in *Newsweek* since 1993. Searching is free, but access to archived articles requires a fee.

Time (www.time.com/time): Search issues of the popular news magazine from 1985. This site provides some free access, but archived articles require a fee for viewing.

U.S. News and World Report (www.usnews.com/usnews/home.htm): Users can access current articles from *U.S. News and World Report* or pay a fee to view archived articles.
