

Q: I understand that. But if this is such a problem within the present system with national service programs and Bush is taking such a hard line against such programs, then why has Bush not vetoed AmeriCorps, Citizen Corps in the status quo? Where is that evidence that AmeriCorps no longer gets funded?
