

Schmit: Can I see your transcript because I'm more than willing to show you ours right now?

Goldstein: Okay, again, this is a crossfire, we'll hand you the evidence as soon as possible.

Schmit: But it's hard to debate over evidence if you're not willing to offer it.

Goldstein: Let's look to logic, then. Logically, would we actually see developing countries pulling out of a protocol when it actually has the ability to create not only better technology under it, but the fact that they can be helped by the clean development mechanism from developed countries?

Schmit: Well, whether or not it's logical, China and India both say they are going to because of the regulations ...

Goldstein: So, is it logical or not?

Schmit: I would say it's logical to pull out of it because of the economic repercussions that are caused by it. And the clean development mechanisms: you told me there are 800 and you told their successes are quoted by the UN. Of course the UN quotes the success.

Goldstein: Okay, now you're questioning our sources? All I'm saying is that the CDMs logically make sense. If you're going to reduce the trade deficit, if you're going to develop technology and spread ideas of technology between countries and reduce your money, then it makes sense. But let's go on to that economics point.

Schmit: Okay.

Goldstein: We've already shown you that through the Conference of Mayors under the exact same standards of the Kyoto ...

Schmit: But they're not under the same standards.

Goldstein: Why not?

Schmit: Because they're not under any timetables, they don't hold businesses to any regulations, and they say pretty much if you want to be involved that's great, but they don't force you to be involved. So, of course, businesses like General Electric can do it, but a smaller business cannot—they can't afford it.

Just so the judges will know, I am going to try my very best to go down her last speech and then return to our own case. Okay, first of all, they claim that it is going to improve international relations, but they can give you absolutely no direct guarantee of this because a large portion of the reason that other countries would be hostile with us is because of our unilateral actions in Iraq and with the war on terror that is not UN sanctioned and not covered under the Protocol, which they have not shown you.
